Pears iwill peers – tips for engaging stakeholders

Engaging with the Board, executives and Governors - try...

- Volunteering award to recognise achievements that volunteers have made
- Concise reporting using a mixture of narratives and infographics (e.g. Venngage, Piktochart

Engaging with hospital staff - try...

- Running regular sessions during the corporate inductions for new Trust members, outlining the benefits that young volunteers can bring to the Trust.
- Including young volunteer in staff inductions.
- Providing **opportunities for feedback** and listen to any arising concerns.
- **Mixing 25+ volunteers with younger volunteers**. For example, allocate pairs between younger volunteers and 25+ volunteers.
- Laminated posters of the jobs that volunteers can do; create a sign in sheet for volunteers on the ward
- 'Top 10 Tips' list for the ward and outpatient areas.
- Creating roles for ward staff to supervise a young volunteer and to work with Peer Support Volunteers when a new volunteer joins the ward.
- Running briefings for ward staff so they know who to contact about volunteering support and what volunteer roles do/don't include.
- Weekly emails from the volunteer manager to ward staff with updates about the volunteering and the opportunity to give feedback.
- Working closely with the patient experience team they are likely to have useful data to inform volunteering opportunities
- **Promoting positive examples of volunteering on hospital wards.** If staff see how well it can work on other wards then are more likely to become involved.
- A recognition programme for staff members who have been engaged with young volunteers.

Engaging your local community – try...

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- **Identifying local education establishments** and community projects start focused and small and then build up.
- Asking young volunteers to accompany the Voluntary services manager to meetings about how the Trust interacts with the local community.
